PRINCIPAL

Hello to our community, family and friends,

As I write this our children are limbering up for the school cross country. I notice cross country is one of those events that polarises opinion: you either love it or hate it. As a runner myself for nearly 50 years I don't claim to understand those who say they hate cross country, but what I do appreciate is that when the whistle blows to start the race I know every child will try their best, at least for the first few hundred metres, and in trying their best some children will discover qualities in themselves that they didn't know they possessed.

A few will experience the satisfaction of winning and good on them for that; most will experience the winning feeling of doing their best. I know that feeling well - I've never won a race in all my years of running, but I've had huge pleasure in giving it my all, achieving a personal best or simply enjoying working my body hard. I hope our children also discover these fundamental pleasures.



OUR SWIMMING POOL IS GOING SOLAR!



After much research the swimming pool management committee has decided to convert the pool from diesel to solar-generated electrical heating. This is a huge leap forward for our community pool, cutting running costs and being environmentally sustainable. The plan is to install three heat pumps, hopefully by the beginning of the next swimming season. Initially we will run them from mains electricity and in 2020 install solar cells on the roof of the hall that will generate most of the electricity to run the heat pumps. When the pool is closed the electricity generated by the solar cells will be diverted to the school.

It's an exciting project, the biggest improvement the pool has seen since the roof structure was built in 2003. We estimate the cost will be around \$110,000 so our focus now is on fund-raising. Already we have had a generous donation of \$10,000 from the Harcourts Foundation and commitments of another \$40,000 from the pool committee's reserves and the board of trustees. We hope to raise the rest through donations, grants and this year's school gala.

CAR PARK AND DROP OFF ZONE

Are you managing the school car park? Thank You!!

A big thanks to you if you are following our car park rules before and after school. If you're not following the rules, it's simple:

DO NOT PARK IN THE YELLOW DROP-OFF ZONE

The drop-off zone is just a pull-through, kiss-'em-goodbye and keep moving. At the end of the day don't hang around in the drop-off zone hoping your child will appear on cue.

If you park in the drop-off zone the traffic piles up and we have the extremely dangerous situation of children moving among vehicles with tense and frustrated drivers - a recipe for a serious accident. We know it's less convenient to have to park your car and walk to meet your child but a few minutes of your patience helps avoid traffic congestion. Don't become the cause of an injury to a child - please follow the rule.

MID-YEAR REPORTS AND LEARNING CONFERENCES

Mid-Year Reports and Learning Conferences - A New Look

Shortly you will receive your child's mid-year report and an invitation to a learning conference. You will notice some changes to the report, with more information about how your child is going with our STAND values, with science/arts/PE/social science, and a greater student comment.

For the learning conferences this time we are trialling not including the children; just parents and teachers. We will continue to hold parent-teacher-child conferences at the start of the year and we welcome your feedback about this approach.

These changes are part of a review of assessment and reporting that we started last year when National Standards were removed. Many of the ideas came from a series of meetings with a parent focus group and thanks to those people for their input and commitment.

Recently we hosted a visit from Ashleigh, a year 6 student from West Auckland, and her teacher, who were visiting the region as guests of Mayor Richard Kempthorne.
