SCHOOL BREAK TIMES

BULLYING PREVENTION AND RESPONSE

This is the second in a three-part series of information about responding to and preventing bullying at Wakefield School.

The impact of bullying

Children who are bullied are more likely to experience symptoms of depression and anxiety and to avoid going to school. Bullying that is particularly sustained, severe or intense may be linked to serious physical and mental health outcomes, including increased risk of suicide.

How do we respond to or prevent bullying?

Effective bullying prevention and response is complex and requires sustained effort from the school and community. We need a safe and positive school culture, regular bullying prevention and response education and swift intervention when bullying is identified.

To develop a safe and positive culture we need our staff, students, whānau and other community members to all share the responsibility of making our school a respectful and inclusive environment. We don't all have to think the same and have the same beliefs, but we do all need to be respectful and tolerant of people who are different to us. Everyone being committed to our school values and demonstrating the behaviours that uphold these values is an important part of growing a safe and positive school culture.

Manaakitanga	The idea of caring about others, uplifting them, supporting them, making them feel at home. Treating others with respect.	Show Respect
Rangatiratanga	The idea of self-determination, self-management, ownership, and leadership.	Take Responsibility
Whāia Te Iti Kahurangi	Seek the treasure that you value most dearly, if you bow your head, let it be to a lofty mountain (Whakatauki)	Aim High
Kia Kaha Tonu	The idea of continuing to be strong, to get stuck in, to keep going when things are challenging.	Never Give Up
Tikanga	The idea of behaving in a way that is culturally proper and appropriate, according to our values in our place.	D o The Right Thing

Research shows that punishing children who bully does not reduce bullying behaviour. The most effective strategies for reducing and preventing bullying require an educational approach. A simple way to think about this is if a child is struggling with reading, we provide extra help. Similarly, if a child is struggling to interact positively with peers, we need to support this child with extra help to learn these skills.

What should you do if you think your child or another child is being bullied?

Very often bullying can be very covert behaviour, this means that it is hidden from the adults. Please don't assume we know what has happened or is happening. If you believe your child has been/is being bullied, please make contact with us as soon as you can. This could be making contact with your child's teacher or, if you feel the situation is serious, contacting the principal or one of our deputy principals. Please also encourage your child to speak to a trusted adult at school if they are concerned for themselves or anyone else.

NO PARKING ZONE REMINDER

Please remember that parking on either side of the road adjacent to our bus bay on Edward Street is not permitted from 8:30am - 9:30am and 2:30pm - 3:30pm. This is because the buses need the space to manoeuvre into the bus bay. Please take care to park elsewhere at these times.

We now have frozen meals available at Wakefield School for the school whanau and friends.



For an optional item, click on your child's initial next to the item to add it to your cart.








